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Executive Summary

INTEGRIS Health is pleased to present the 2022 Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA). The purpose of the CHNA report is to provide an overview of the health needs and priorities associated within Garfield County. INTEGRIS Bass Baptist Health Center has identified this geographic area as their community. The goal of this report is to provide residents with a deeper understanding of the health needs in their community and to help guide the hospitals in their community benefit planning efforts and the development of an implementation strategy to address identified needs. The CHNA involved a review of both quantitative and qualitative data to attain the full scope of the community needs as they pertain to health, with an emphasis on the economically poor and underserved populations.

This summary is documentation that INTEGRIS Bass Baptist Health Center is within compliance with IRS requirements for conducting a Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA). INTEGRIS Bass Baptist Health Center last conducted a CHNA in 2018.

The Affordable Care Act (ACA) requires 501(c)(3), tax-exempt hospitals to conduct a CHNA every three tax years and to adopt a strategic implementation plan for addressing identified needs.

Identified priorities for the next cycle are: Access to Care, Access to Healthy Food, and Tobacco. Many of the initiatives identified and implemented in the previous CHNA will be continued, along with new programs.

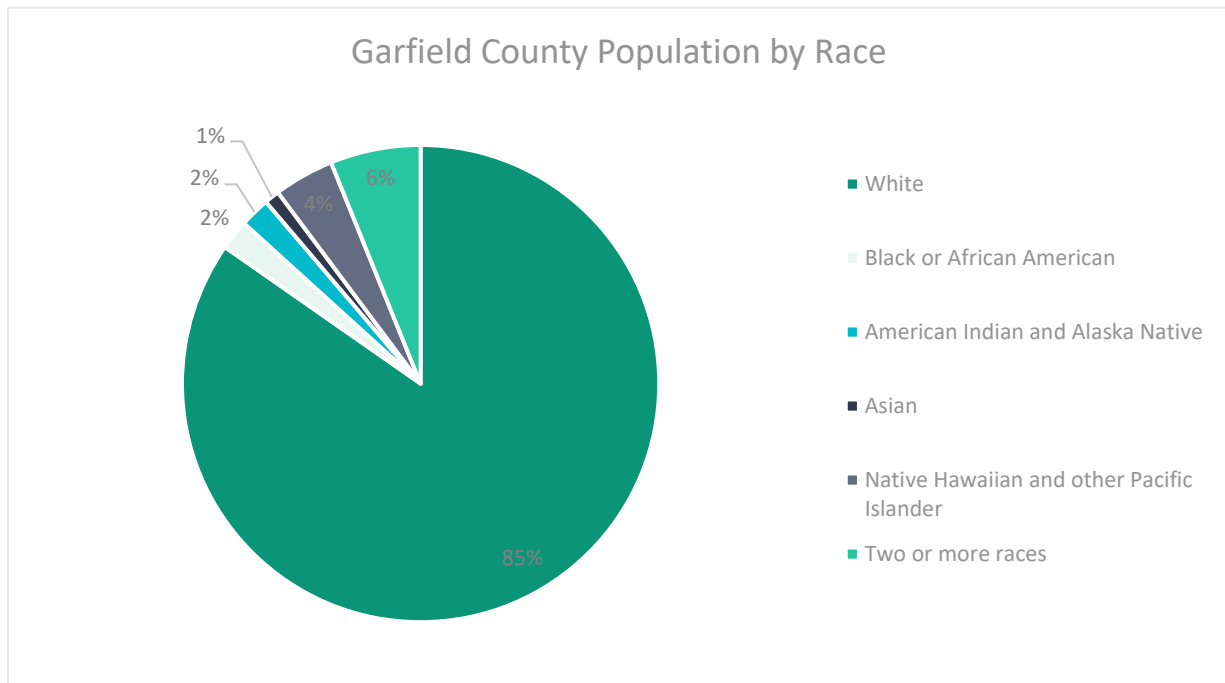

Garfield County is in northwestern Oklahoma. Enid is the county seat and the largest city in Garfield County. Fifteen small towns are located within the county. Primary industries in the county are agriculture and livestock. In addition, oil and gas and flour milling have proved fruitful for the county. Enid has the most grain storage capacity in the United States and one of the largest grain elevators in the world. Vance Air Force Base is also a major employer of both military and civilian personnel.

The county is mostly rural, occupying 1,058.47 square miles. (2) The county has two hospitals, multiple minor emergency clinics, a free community clinic, a federally qualified health center and a county health department.

Hospital Information

INTEGRIS Bass Baptist Health Center

The INTEGRIS Bass Baptist Health Center enjoys the distinctions of being the only non-profit, faith-based hospital in Enid and having served the Enid area longer than any other general hospital. INTEGRIS Bass Baptist Health Center campus in Enid, OK includes 207 licensed beds throughout three facilities.

Services provided/major specialties:

INTEGRIS Bass Baptist Health Center offers acute care and diagnostic services, skilled nursing, a cancer center, a state-of-the-art Heart and Vascular Institute, a cardiac catheterization laboratory, cardiovascular and thoracic surgery, geriatric behavioral health services, OB/GYN services, home health services and occupational health services.

INTEGRIS Bass Meadowlake offers both acute and residential behavioral health services to children and adolescents. Adult services are offered on an outpatient basis.



Community Health Needs Assessment Process

INTEGRIS Health collaborated with local community partners to conduct the Community Health Needs Assessment.

Methods of collecting and analyzing data and information included online surveys, focus groups, published data, and hospital specific data.

Focus groups were conducted to dialogue directly with local community members. There was a targeted effort to conduct focus groups with at-risk populations in low socioeconomic zip codes. Community partners that assisted in data collection for community chats included local nonprofit organizations.

Community surveys were available online. Each partner utilized social media to publicize the survey to residents in their service area. The dissemination of the online survey included local coalitions, partnerships and INTEGRIS Bass Baptist Health Center staff.

Primary Data

INTEGRIS Health gathered community input from Garfield County residents of all backgrounds, socioeconomic status, and demographics. Input included members of underserved, low-income, and minority populations. Additionally, the hospitals provided internal data for analysis and consideration.

Published Secondary Data

In addition to the input from community chats and online surveys, the compilation of public health data, state, and national data, gave a broader view of the overall health status of the county. By looking at past and present data and identifying trends, strategic development for the Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) will be more efficient and ultimately more effective.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, local health departments were unable to publish updated public health data. INTEGRIS Health reviewed and used the most current available data for the purpose of providing a comprehensive overview of the community.

Community Input

Methodology

In total, the online survey was administered to 69 individuals, and focus group surveys were conducted among 12 participants to gather qualitative data. The focus groups were adapted due to COVID-19 restrictions. After INTEGRIS Health collected this qualitative and quantitative data, they returned it to the INTEGRIS Community Benefit Department for analysis.

Data Collection

INTEGRIS Health representatives provided opportunities for individuals to participate in both quantitative and qualitative surveys in the INTEGRIS Bass Baptist Health Center service area. The final breakdown of data collection at the facilities included:

Findings and Recommendations: Online Quantitative Survey

When reviewing the quantitative surveys among the 69 participants in Garfield County, all surveys were analyzed to find commonalities and important findings.

Overall, feedback from community members in the quantitative surveys highlights a need to address the neighborhood and built environment (including reducing the number of injuries related to car accidents/dangerous roads and increasing the availability of affordable foods) and health care access (including reducing the proportions of people who are unable to get medical care). INTEGRIS Health is well positioned to continue to build upon its reputation as a trusted partner in the Garfield County community.

Findings and Recommendations: Quantitative Focus Group Surveys

When analyzing qualitative feedback from 12 participants completing their focus group surveys, major themes arose across the two focus groups and twelve-open-ended questions: A need and desire for greater access to health care services (including but not limited to access to affordable medications/care and mental health services).

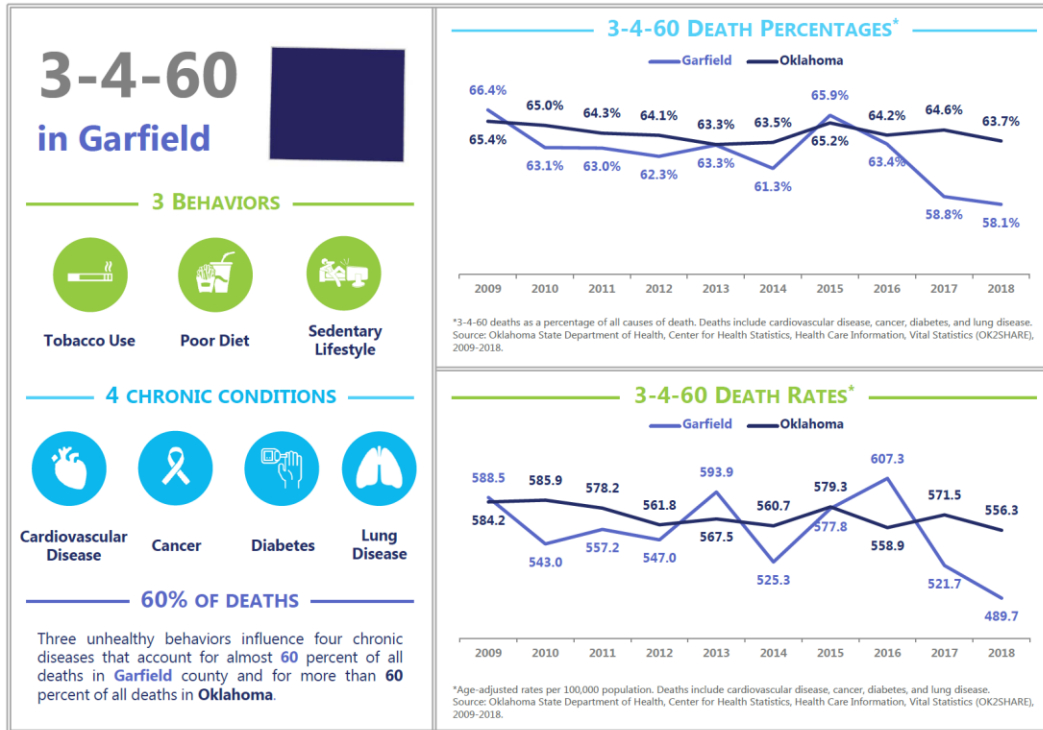

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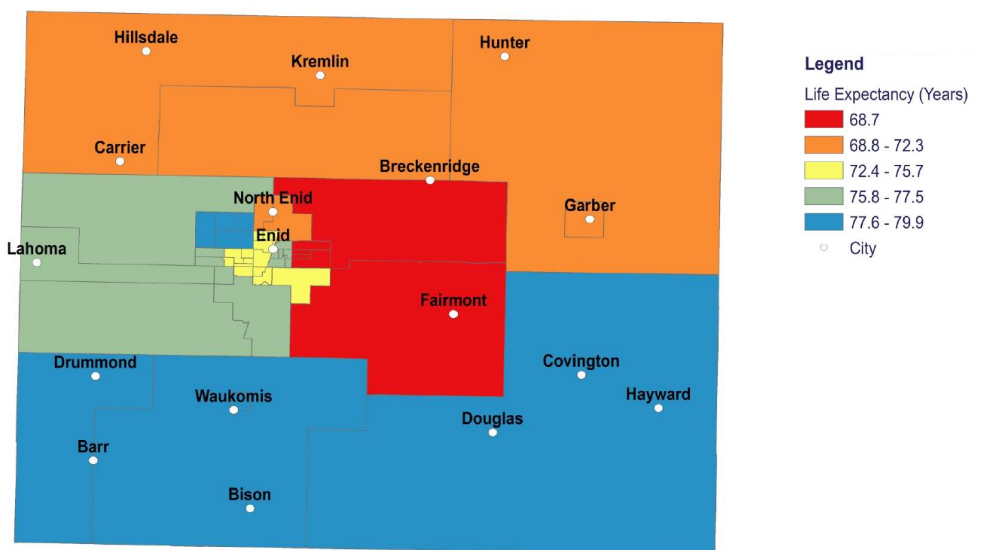

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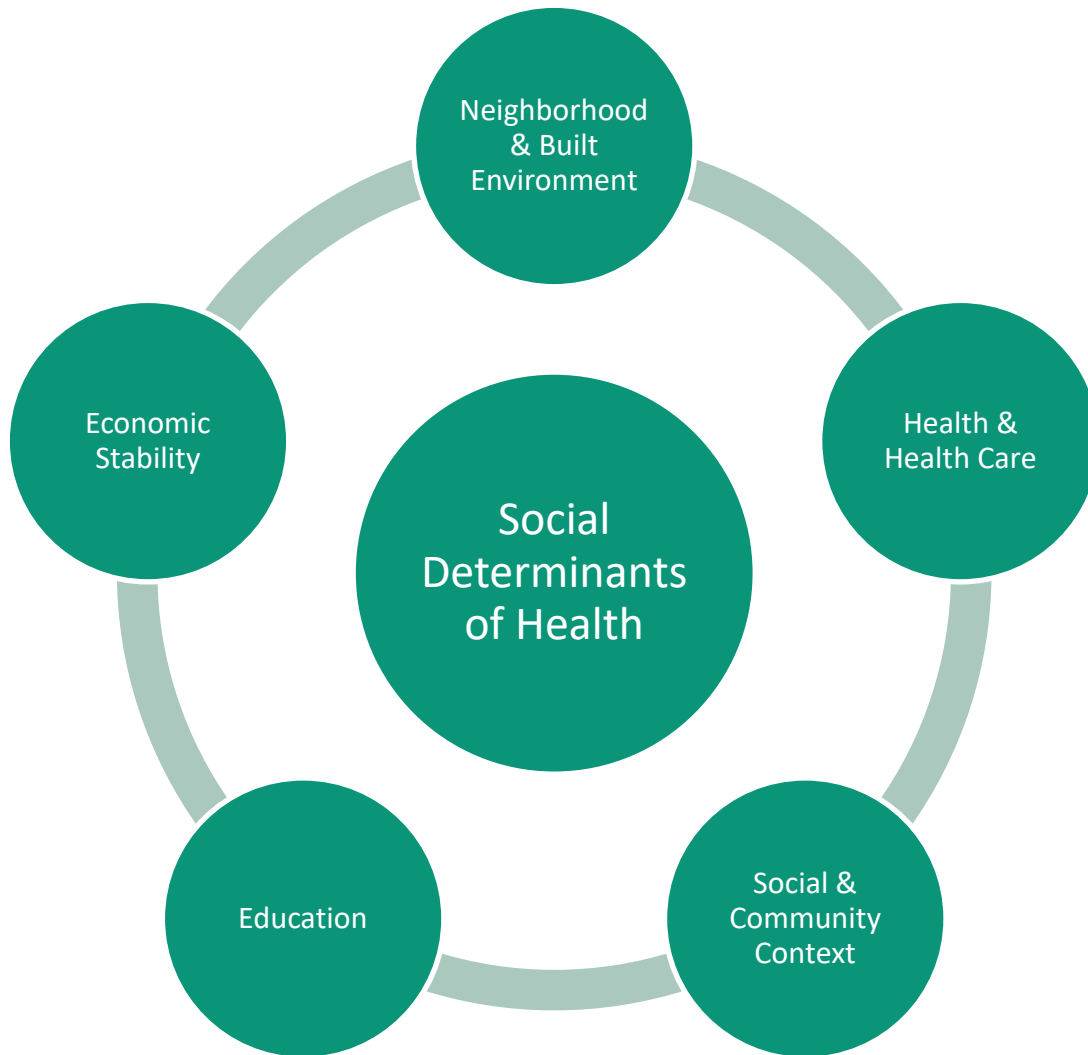


Garfield County Life Expectancy

Community Priority Issues

Primary and secondary data were evaluated and synthesized to identify significant community health needs in Garfield County. Community health needs were prioritized based on several criteria: magnitude/severity of health issues; opportunity to intervene at a prevention level; circle of influence/ability to impact change; support from the community; capacity to address underserved populations as well as populations deemed vulnerable. The following community health needs were selected as the top three priorities:

Health & Healthcare

Obesity

Currently, 34.8 % of adults in Oklahoma are obese. (1) Citizens rely on cars, trucks, and buses more than ever for their commute to work and school. This can often lead to sedentary lifestyles that contribute significantly to weight gain. The increased convenience of unhealthy, inexpensive fast food coupled with the inability to access low-cost healthy food is a major factor in the obesity epidemic.

Access to Care

Access to comprehensive, quality health care services promotes and maintains good health, prevents and manages diseases, reduces unnecessary disability and premature death, and encourages health equity. Three components of access are insurance coverage, availability of health services, and timeliness of care. The uninsured and underinsured populations experience delays in receiving timely care and lack the ability to receive preventative treatments. They often seek care in the local emergency rooms, which results in preventable hospital admissions.

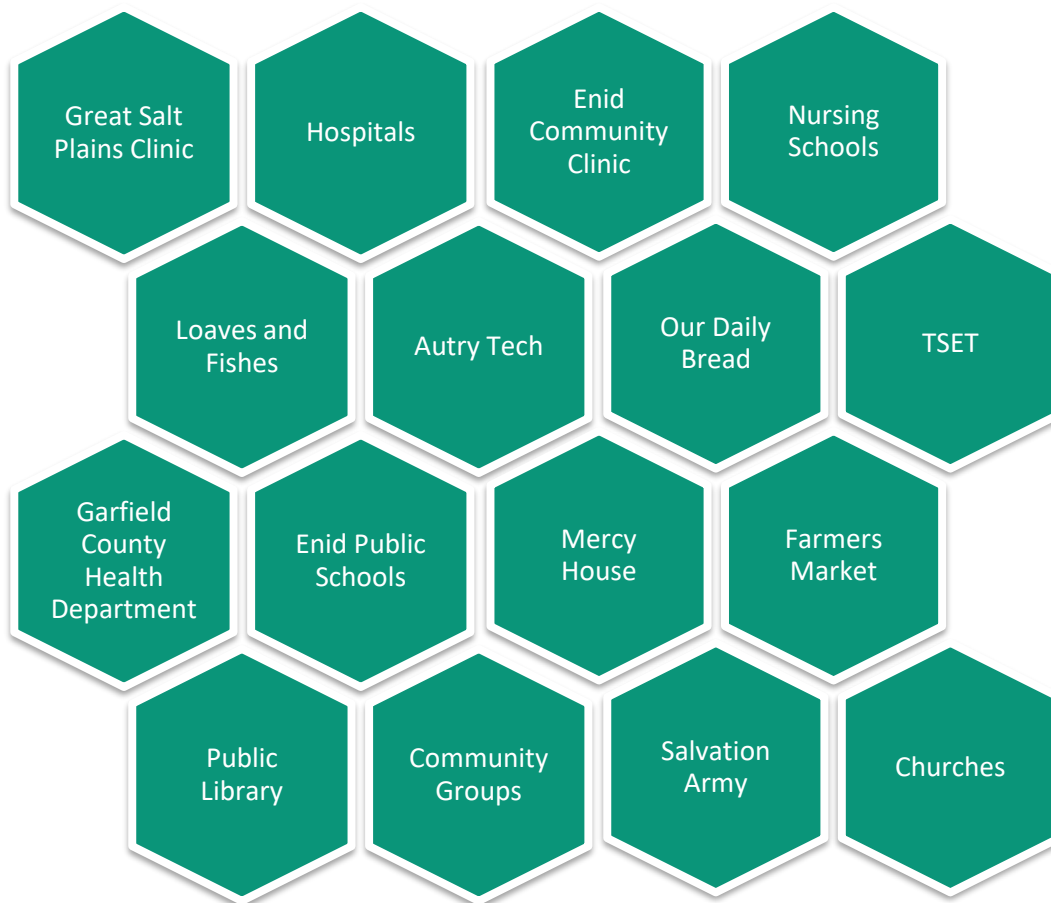

Potentially Available Resources

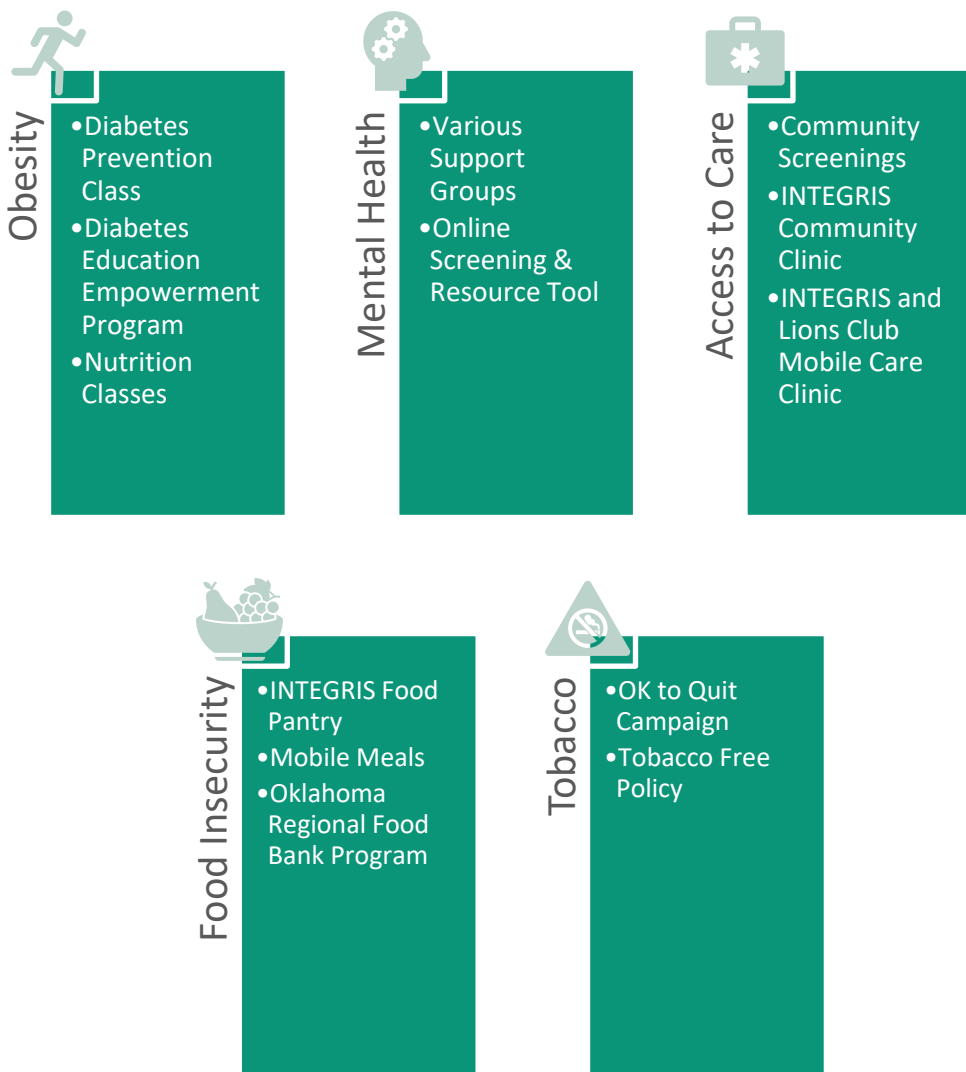

Evaluation of Impact

INTEGRIS Bass Baptist Health Center developed a CHIP (Community Health Improvement Plan) designed to meet the needs of the community based on the results of a CHNA (Community Health Needs Assessment). This health improvement plan focuses on Obesity, Mental Health, Access to Care/Food Insecurity and Tobacco. These issues were chosen based on state and local data, surveys, identifiable gaps, available resources, and small community chats. The CHIP was developed using the results of the community’s health priorities. Implementation steps are based upon the key strategies of prevention, education, and collaboration.

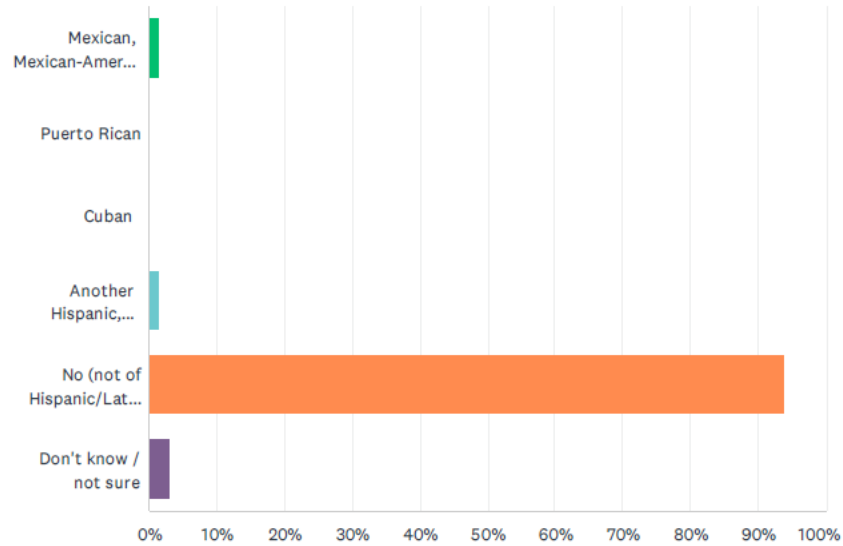

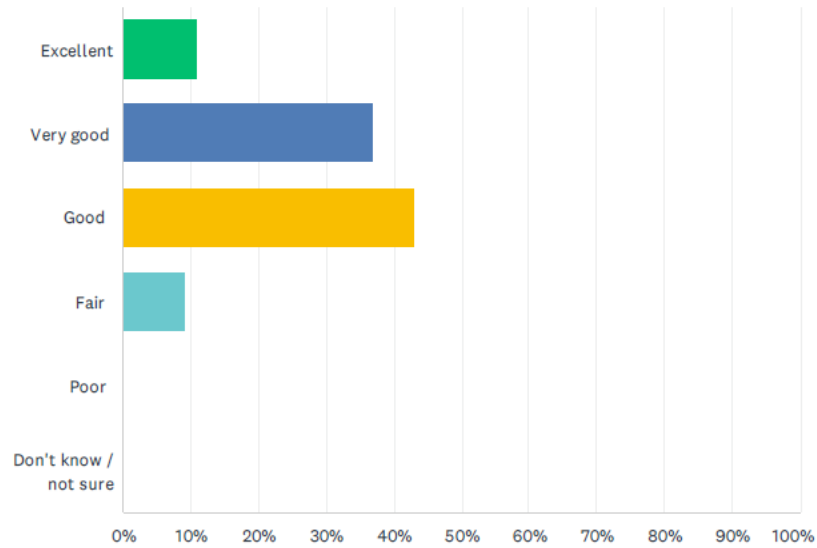

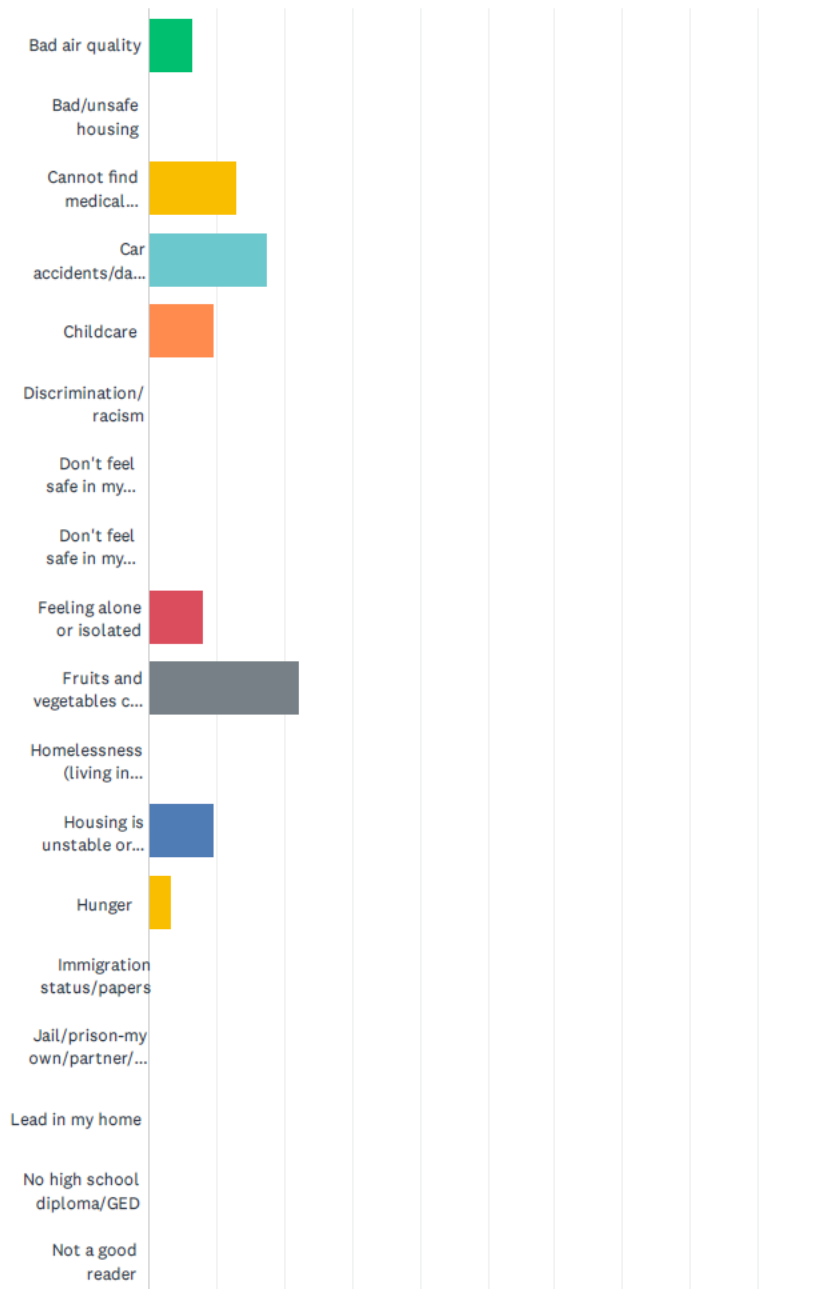

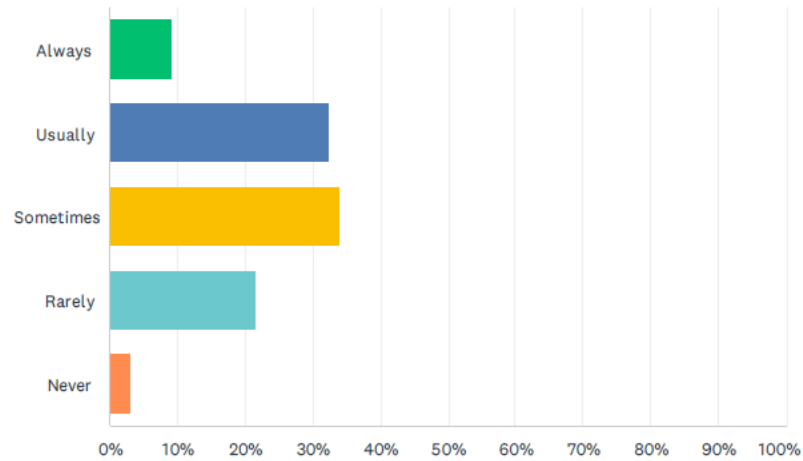

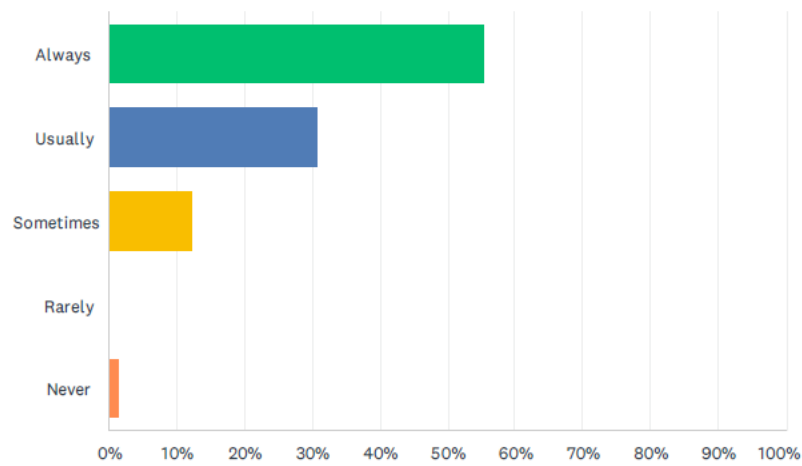

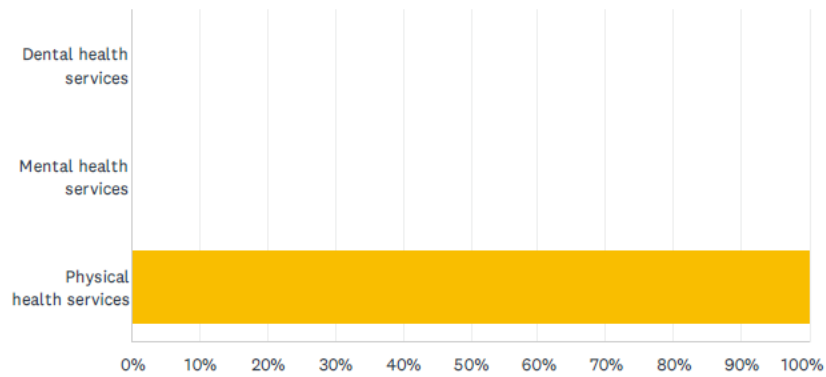

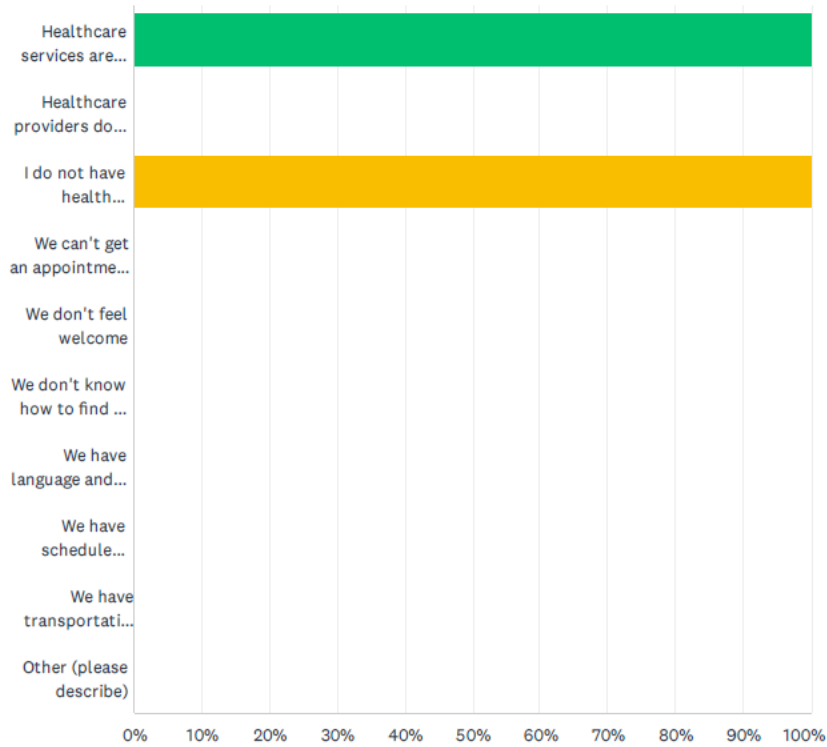

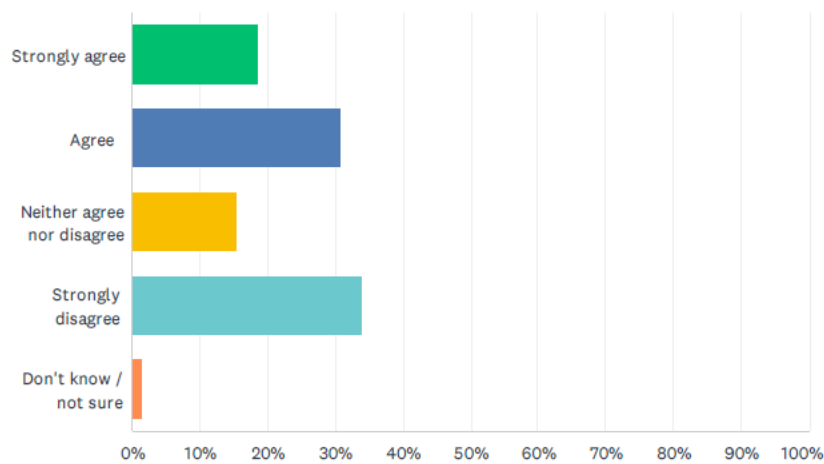

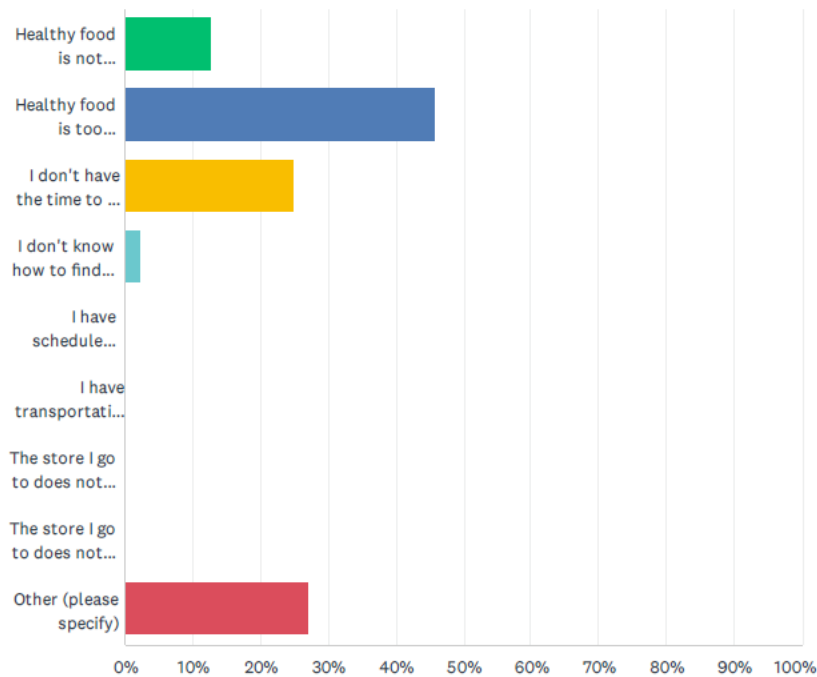

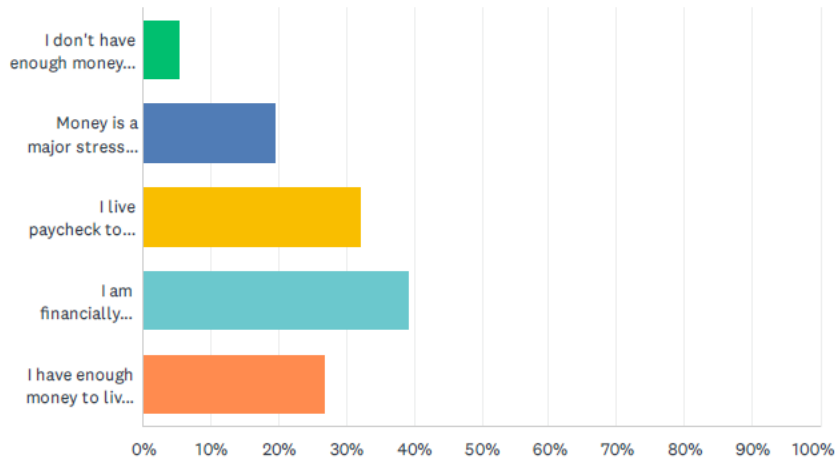

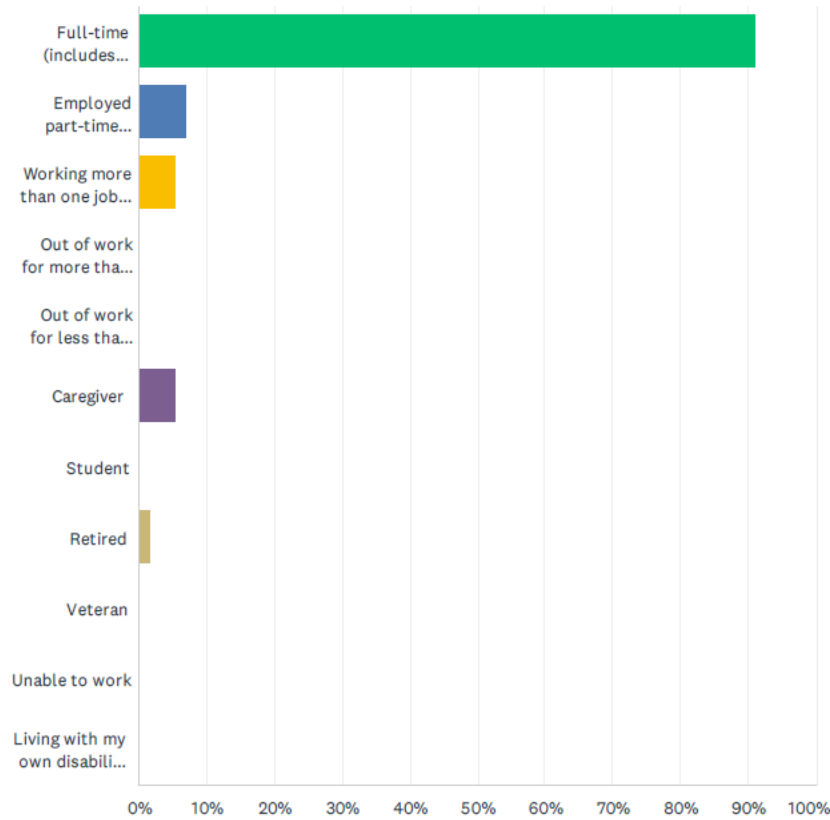

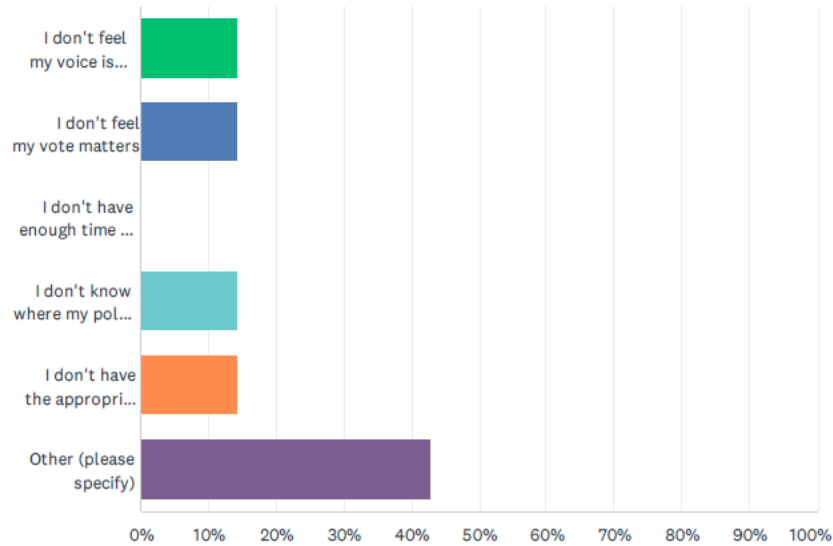

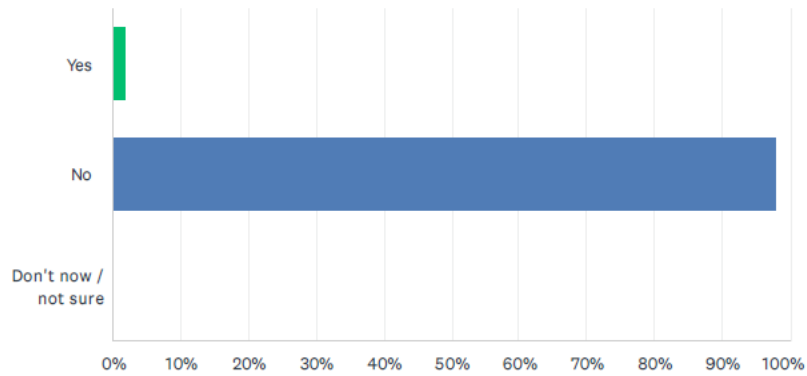

 - Transportation is lacking. The current option has to be scheduled 24 hours in advance and costs \$4 per ride. No cab company.
 - Language barrier.

2. ACCESS TO EDUCATION

- Overall experience with education from grade school up to now:
 - The Enid Public School system is forward thinking and addressing early childhood. Looking at a Hope Summit.
 - Autry Tech offers many courses.
 - Northwestern Oklahoma State University offers a variety of courses including nursing.
 - Northern Oklahoma College offers a variety of courses including nursing.
- Decision to not seek more education and goals for the future:
 - It is difficult to get young professionals to come back to Enid to live and work.
 - Autry, NOC, NWOSU and Enid Regional Development Alliance are working together to build a proper curricular design.

3. MEANINGFUL EMPLOYMENT

- Challenges most people face on the path to an ideal job:
 - There are a lot of jobs available within the community; however, they are not considered meaningful. Things to consider are pay rate, childcare options.
- Many folks are not aware of how to interview or write a resume.
- The recent job fair was unsuccessful (probably due to COVID).
- There is disparity in the community with electronic applications and possible lack of IT infrastructure.
- The Workforce Office will assist with resumes and employment.
- CDSA helps with resume building and interview skills.
- Enid Young Professionals is a great avenue for networking.

4. ACCESS TO FOOD

- Availability of fresh food:
 - Regional Food Bank Resource Center in Enid (Loaves and Fishes) offers fresh fruit, vegetables and meats.
 - Walmart and Jumbo Foods provides retail recovery to Loaves and Fishes.
 - Meals are offered every night at a designated local church.
 - Daily Bread provides daily meals.
 - Enid is strong in the food arena; however, outside communities have deficiencies.
 - WIC requires recipients to participate in classes and not many enroll. DHS has gone to an on-line application and this may be difficult for some.
 - South and East areas of Enid have less food options and selection.
 - Groceries stores are mainly located on the West side of town.
- Households in the community having difficulty getting foods they need or run out of food:
 - Children need food during school breaks.
 - There are summer feeding programs for children; however, the location for distribution could be a barrier for those living on the East side of town.
 - RSVP feeds senior citizens.
 - Wheat Heart Nutrition offers meals.

5. DO YOU KNOW SOMEONE TOLD BY A HEALTH PROVIDER TO EAT DIFFERENTLY, DO THEY?

- They don't eat differently due to cost, convenience and lack of education.
- There is a perception to treat the condition with medication instead of eating right.
- There is no longer an outpatient dietician available at INTEGRIS Bass.
- TSET Health Living is available and the healthy policies needs to be adopted.

6. INTEREST IN HEALTH FOOD CLASSES

- Lab literacy.
- Diabetes classes (offer as employee wellness).
- Meal planning classes including budget.
- Many of the INTEGRIS Health plans are only available in Oklahoma City; not in Enid.
- Programs need to be effective.

1. ACCESS TO HEALTHCARE

- **Biggest health problems in community:**
 - Difficult to get an appointment with a family practice provider. With the closure of the residency program, there aren't enough FP providers.
 - Aging physician population; no replacements.
 - Recruitment to Enid is more difficult since this is a smaller town and some feel there is less to offer.
 - Enid used to be considered the hub for Northwest Oklahoma, but it appears to be shrinking.
 - Some of the Enid specialists are out of their office regularly doing satellite clinics in outlying areas.
 - Mental Health
- **Biggest health assets or resources for health in community:**
 - NWOSU nursing program.
 - NOC nursing program.
 - Autry Tech nursing/medical programs. Autry is a huge asset to the community. Their curriculum is planned around the community's needs.
 - Strong leadership in the medical field which stepped up during the pandemic (both hospitals and Garfield County Health Department).
 - Community encouragement and support throughout the pandemic was impressive.
- **Biggest barriers that keep people from accessing health care in the community:**
 - There is only one pediatric dentist in the community who takes Sooner Care.
 - Some of the population cannot afford their meds.
 - Lack of available transportation to medical appointments. Enid Community Clinic provides travel vouchers for patients to return for visits.
 - RSVP has drivers who help transport patients to and from appointments including OKC. Not everyone is aware of this service.
 - Some are challenged in using technology to schedule appointments and see test results.

2. ACCESS TO EDUCATION

- Overall experience with education from grade school up to now:
 - Education opportunities with Autry Tech, NWOSU and NOC.
 - Private schools include OBA, St. Joseph's, Emmanuel and Lutheran.
 - There are twelve sending schools to Autry.
 - Autry Tech serves as a satellite for the Oklahoma Math and Science Institute.
 - Overall, Enid offers good education opportunities.
 - Enid Public Schools has done a good job with the public sector. A \$93M bond to support the schools passed a few years back.
 - YMCA's after school program received funding from the Hope Fund.
- Decision to not seek more education and goals for the future:
 - Cost is a major factor in making a decision about formal education.
 - Big problem is that someone paid too much for the higher education and cannot find a job.
 - People should figure out what they want to do before paying a lot of money for higher education.
 - Enid Public Schools offers concurrent courses with NOC.
 - There are many resources out there for students but they don't know how to access them. School counselors are stretched thin.

3. MEANINGFUL EMPLOYMENT

- Challenges most people face on the path to an ideal job:
 - Lack of jobs online and low pay scale.
 - Autry is developing a program to place candidates to specific jobs.

4. ACCESS TO FOOD

- Availability of fresh food:
 - There is a Saturday morning farmer's market during the summer.
 - The local grocer, Jumbo Foods, has four locations throughout Enid allowing the majority access to groceries within walking distance.
 - Enid has several Dollar General locations.
- Households in the community having difficulty getting foods they need or run out of food:
 - Enid has a big backpack program during the school year and a summer lunch program.
 - Loaves and Fishes and Enid Public Schools does a lot of work feeding the kids.
 - Our Daily Bread offer meals during the week.
 - Local churches work together to provide meals to those in need.
 - Mercy House transports homeless people to meals.
 - Salvation Army provides daily meals.

5. DO YOU KNOW SOMEONE TOLD BY A HEALTH PROVIDER TO EAT DIFFERENTLY, DO THEY?

- At the Enid Community Clinic, many are diabetic patients who are non-compliant.

6. INTEREST IN HEALTH FOOD CLASSES

- This is a uphill battle to get kids to eat healthy. It could be a ten-week program or a cultural change.
- Autry will offer culinary classes early next fall.
- Finding a place to teach people how to cook so that they will enjoy it is a challenge.

7. TOP PUBLIC HEALTH PRIORITY FOR NEXT FIVE YEARS

- Mental Health access; not enough mental health workers to meet the needs.
- Homeless population is full of people with mental health issues.
- The Oasis Program is not state funded. This is for rehab and difficult to fund.
